'Meet the Professional' Course (G1-8)

Combining career exploration and social awareness, students will achieve the following learning goals:

- 1. General Knowledge: Through meeting and interviewing an industry veteran, students can explore a profession in-depth and the required skills, learning topical knowledge related to that profession.
- **2. Writing:** Students will learn and apply vocabulary related to the profession in their final outputs, which will be closely related to the week's topic. In that way, they can learn to write with relevance and context.
- **3. Speaking:** By preparing for interviews with industry experts, students will practise critical thinking and interview skills. They will also present their work to peers through jigsaw learning and/or deliver formal presentations to the class.
- **4. Other Skills:** Critical thinking, collaboration, entrepreneurship, work ethics, and greater social awareness.

Explore Dark Green Planet , an innovative tour of interactive exhibits created by Dialogue in the Dark x V'air and led by visually impaired guides who will teach us about hidden dimensions to sustainability and conservation. Students will reflect on their thoughts on the experience, and both their existing and newly-gained knowledge of the environment, producing outputs that bring these together. **For this module, there will be an additional \$180 charged for the entrance fee. Building a Narrative Course (G5-12)



A strong narrative/personal statement can mean the difference between admission or rejection. In this 2-week crash course, students will learn how to brainstorm, plan, and write **an application-ready personal statement** for themselves.

(The course material will cater to G5-8 students applying for international/boarding schools and G9-12 students preparing for university applications.)

As an essential skill for English exams and coursework, including IGCSE and IB, literary analysis requires the ability to think critically and make logical interpretations of texts. In this course, students will scrutinise literature commonly studied in schools, resulting in **analytical essays** on themes, motifs and more.

Path to Humanity Course (G4-12)

Even before the Universal Declaration of Human Rights in 1948, human rights have long been crucial for reducing inequalities and promoting human flourishing. This class will introduce students to the nuanced **history of human rights** both through analyzing the rights of **marginalized communities** like women and refugees and more ubiquitous themes like economic, social, and cultural rights. Through papers, debates, and mock trials, students will learn about human rights while developing critical thinking and writing skills.


